Southampton and Winchester Visitors Group

The Executive Committee presents its report and the financial statements for the year ended 31st August 2018.

Governance and management

The Executive Committee comprises a minimum of 5 and a maximum of 9 members elected at each Annual General Meeting. In addition the Committee may co-opt up to 2 additional members. Members of the Committee who held office during the year are listed on page 2. The Committee meets monthly and is supported by a number of sub-committees each of which includes at least one member of the Committee. The committee also meets annually to discuss longer term issues and develop an action plan.

Aims and objectives

The main objects of the Group as set out in its constitution are:

For the relief of need, hardship and distress in the United Kingdom amongst refugees, asylum seekers and other immigrants by providing such charitable assistance as the Executive Committee think fit, including providing such persons with advice, assistance, representation, counselling, in matters such as money, debts, welfare, benefits, housing, health, asylum, immigration, education, training and employment.

Focus of our work

The Group is a volunteer led charity whose members work with asylum seekers and refugees mainly living in Southampton. The core of our work is to provide one-to-one support for individual clients who are assigned a trained visitor who meets with them regularly to provide friendship and practical help.

Our ASSIST scheme provides some temporary financial support to those clients pursuing their asylum claim, who are destitute but are not entitled to receive benefits or undertake paid work. Our Legal Justice fund allows us to use the services of a very experienced immigration solicitor who provides advice to the Group on individual client cases and provides training for our members.

Review of the year

About our clients

Forty clients (with sixteen children) have been visited regularly and thirty eight others have stayed in occasional contact. Our clients came from thirty countries, the main countries of origin being Iran, Iraq and Zimbabwe.

Twenty one clients (with seven children) have received financial support from the ASSIST scheme for part or all of the year.

Seven clients have been granted leave to remain in the UK.

About our volunteers and staff

The Group has approximately 75 volunteers. 41 of our volunteers who are trained visitors visited one or more clients for all or part of the year. A further 16 volunteers are available for English teaching

The Group employs 2 part-time staff providing essential support services.

The ASSIST scheme and accommodation for clients

The hostel which was set up in June 2017 has operated successfully since it opened and its 6 rooms have generally been fully occupied. The average cost of providing a room in the hostel is about £90 per week. The scheme also provides a subsistence allowance which was increased from £35 to £40 per week in August 2018. The cost this year for accommodation and subsistence was £51,332. Accommodation and the allowance are initially allocated to individual clients for a maximum period of 8 weeks with a review taking place every 4 or 8 weeks thereafter.

The scheme also provides assistance for a short period to clients who obtain leave to remain but are not given the right to claim benefits or access other services (no recourse to public funds) and to those experiencing long delays in receiving benefits or finding work.

Other client support

The group organises various social activities for clients particularly those with children and also provides funds for clients' hobbies and fitness activities. It also helps clients with travel costs, education materials and exam fees and purchases clothing, toys for children, bicycles and a wide range of other items. In 2017 a group of volunteers started to offer one to one English language teaching to those who find class based learning difficult. The project is now being funded by a grant from the Santander Foundation. There are currently 16 tutors.

Legal Justice Fund

Clients with asylum claims continue to find solicitors with access to legal aid avoiding the need for the fund to meet most legal fees. The fund has continued to meet the cost of training for members, to pay for specialist reports and translators and client travel costs to court hearings, to meet solicitors and to submit claims.

The fund is also used to assist clients who have been granted limited leave to remain and who are then required to pay renewal fees to the Home Office and a health levy. The total cost of these charges is currently $\pounds 1,311$ per person including children.

Campaigning

We invited the Minister of State for Immigration to meet SWVG and other refugee support organisations in Southampton in June. During the meeting a dozen asylum seekers talked to her about their experiences of seeking asylum in the UK.

We are lobbying local politicians to improve the provision of English language classes and supporting the "Lift the Ban" campaign on the right to work, which would greatly help people's well-being and integration while they are seeking asylum.

We also campaign against the cost of having to deliver "fresh claims" in person to Liverpool.

Finance

Receipts for the year were £111,476, an increase of £37,525 compared to last year. Payments totalled £92,516, an increase of £8,532. The net surplus of £18,960 compares to a deficit of £9,943 for 2017.

Receipts included grants from charitable trusts of £77,700 compared to £37,200 in 2017. We are very grateful for further grants from The Bromley Trust and The Tolkien Trust and for a number of new grants. Details of grants received are set out on page 8 of this report.

Income received from individual donors increased by $\pounds 4,134$. Income from local organisations reduced by $\pounds 6,664$ and from fund-raising events reduced by $\pounds 332$. We are grateful for the support we have received from local churches, other organisations and many individuals.

Payments included those related to clients of $\pounds 69,191$, an increase of $\pounds 13,449$, reversing most of the reduction that occurred in 2017.

Reserves Policy

The Executive Committee has reviewed its reserves policy and decided that the value of reserves should be between $\pounds40,000$ and $\pounds50,000$, based on the commitment for the hostel lease, 3 month's expenditure for subsistence payments to clients, (based on the average of the last two years) and 6 months for other expenditure. Reserves at the year end exceeded the level set by the trustees due the receipt of several grants in the last quarter of the year to be spent in 2018/19.
